Growing in your journey

5 skills that will help you on your journey

1. The end goal

You should always keep the end goal in mind. The end goal is to live the life that Jesus has called you to – to be a disciple of Jesus.

2. Make sure you pray

It is impossible to achieve the purposes of God by simply being given information. We need to start building our relationship with God. Therefore, prayer is an important foundation when we first begin to read the Bible. Ask God to guide you and to help you understand what is written.

3. Be patient with yourself

It can be hard, at first, to get to grips with what the Bible is saying and apply it to our lives. Be patient with yourself as you begin to find out what it means to be a Christian.

4. Be consistent

Spend time reading the Bible, consistently. The more that you read scriptures, the more they will begin to sink in. In between sessions, go back over the scriptures that were discussed in the last session. Ask yourself the same questions and think how you could apply what you are learning to your life.

5. Tenacity will see you through

Keeping on, even when you don't want to, will help you understand the Bible more and more. Keep going; read it again; ask Jesus what he is teaching you. He will reply!

Who is Jesus?

Understanding your faith

Would you be able to explain who Jesus is?

- The name Jesus means 'saviour', while the title Christ means 'anointed'.
- He was born of a virgin (Matthew 1.18).
- Because he is God, Christ has unique attributes (John 1.1).
- His very nature is divine (Philippians 2.6).
- In Christ, the fullness of God dwells (Colossians 2.9–10).

Purposeful lifestyle – living a prophetic lifestyle

An example from life:

- Our lives should reflect Christ's teaching.
- If it was possible to place a mirror in front of God, the image reflected would be that of Jesus Christ. His life reflected God's word (Hebrews 1.2–3).

How should I respond?

• I should acknowledge that Jesus is Lord of all situations (Matthew 14.26–33; see also Philippians 2.9–11).

What do I need to understand?

- Christ's mission was to make salvation known to humankind (Mark 2.15–17).
- His authority extends to the forgiving of sins (Mark 2.5–7).
- The reason why he chose to die was to rescue sinners (Mark 10.45).

What can I do to make a difference?

 Tell someone how much you value what Christ has done for you.

What next?

 Explain to someone you love and trust who Jesus is and why you have given your life to him.

Understanding your faith

Do you understand why the Bible is so important?

- The Bible is described as God's word (2 Timothy 3.16–17).
- The Bible is your instruction book for a properly functioning life; just as electrical appliances need handbooks, so do we.
- The Bible shows us how to choose between those things that will bring joy and those things that can wreck life and make it dysfunctional.
- The Bible also teaches us how to fix things that have gone wrong in our life.
- The Bible is a personal book; it is a book given to you from God (2 Timothy 3.16–17).

Purposeful lifestyle – living a prophetic lifestyle

An example from life:

Relationships are about loving one another. One of the ways
we express relationships is through communication; we talk to
each other. The Bible is God's love letter to us, expressing how
he feels about us and the world in which we live. The Bible is
alive, sharp and useful for many purposes (Hebrews 4.12).

How should I respond?

• Recognise that God is trying to plant his word in your heart like a seed (Matthew 13.1–9).

What do I need to understand?

- God watches over the seed, his word (Isaiah 55.10–11).
- The growth of the seed is directed by God (Mark 4.26–29).

What can I do to make a difference?

• Read the Bible as a discipline.

What next?

 You could begin to memorise scriptures as an additional step, and you could use a daily devotional in addition to this study. A daily devotional could be a Bible reading plan, a series of things to think about or a selection of Bible verses with an explanation. It's not intended just to give you more information, but to change your heart and bring you closer to God and his plans for your life.

his book tells about a number of "beginnings"—the creation of the world and of the first man and woman. It also tells how God

made a special covenant (agreement) with Abraham and promised to bless him and his descendants. Genesis also includes a number of stories about two of Abraham's descendants: his grandson Jacob, who was also known as Israel, and Abraham's great-grandson Joseph who became an important administrator and court official for the king of Egypt.

The Story of Creation

In the beginning God created the heavens and the earth.

2 The earth was barren, with no form of life; it was under a roaring ocean covered with darkness.

But the Spirit of God was moving over the water.

The First Day

³ God said, "I command light to shine!" And light started shining. ⁴ God looked at the light and saw that it was good. He separated light from darkness ⁵ and named the light "Day" and the darkness "Night." Evening came and then morning—that was the first day.

The Second Day

⁶ God said, "I command a dome to separate the water above it from the water below it." ⁷ And that's what happened. God made the dome ⁸ and named it "Sky." Evening came and then morning—that was the second day.

The Third Day

⁹ God said, "I command the water under the sky to come together in one place, so there will be dry

ground." And that's what happened. ¹⁰ God named the dry ground "Land," and he named the water "Ocean." God looked at what he had done and saw that it was good.

¹¹ God said, "I command the earth to produce all kinds of plants, including fruit trees and grain." And that's what happened. ¹² The earth produced all kinds of vegetation. God looked at what he had done, and it was good. ¹³ Evening came and then morning—that was the third day.

The Fourth Day

¹⁴ God said, "I command lights to appear in the sky and to separate day from night and to show the time for seasons, special days, and years. ¹⁵ I command them to shine on the earth." And that's what happened. ¹⁶ God made two powerful lights, the brighter one to rule the day and the other to rule the night. He also made the stars. ¹⁷ Then God put these lights in the sky to shine on the earth, ¹⁸ to rule day and night, and to separate light from darkness. God looked at what he had done, and it was good. ¹⁹ Evening came and then morning—that was the fourth day.

The Fifth Day

²⁰ God said, "I command the ocean to be full of living creatures, and I command birds to fly above the earth." ²¹ So God made the giant sea monsters and all the living creatures that swim in the ocean.

He also made every kind of bird. God looked at what he had done, and it was good. ²² Then he gave the living creatures his blessing—he told the ocean creatures to live everywhere in the ocean and the birds to live everywhere on earth. ²³ Evening came and then morning—that was the fifth day.

The Sixth Day

²⁴ God said, "I command the earth to give life to all kinds of tame animals, wild animals, and reptiles." And that's what happened. ²⁵ God made every one of them. Then he looked at what he had done, and it was good.

²⁶ God said, "Now we will make humans, and they will be like us. We will let them rule the fish, the birds, and all other living creatures."

²⁷ So God created humans to be like himself; he made men and women. ²⁸ God gave them his blessing and said:

Have a lot of children! Fill the earth with people and bring it under your control. Rule over the fish in the ocean, the birds in the sky, and every animal on the earth.

²⁹ I have provided all kinds of fruit and grain for you to eat. ³⁰ And I have given the green plants as food for everything else that breathes. These will be food for animals, both wild and tame, and for birds.

³¹ God looked at what he had done. All of it was very good! Evening came and then morning—that was the sixth day.

So the heavens and the earth and everything else were created.

The Seventh Day

² By the seventh day God had finished his work, and so he rested. ³ God blessed the seventh day and made it special because on that day he rested from his work

⁴That's how God created the heavens and the earth.

The Garden of Eden

When the LORD God made the heavens and the earth, ⁵ no grass or plants were growing anywhere. God had not yet sent any rain, and there was no one to work the land. ⁶ But streams came up from the ground and watered the earth.

⁷The LORD God took a handful of soil and made a man. God breathed life into the man, and the man started breathing. ⁸The LORD made a garden in a place called Eden, which was in the east, and he put the man there.

⁹The LORD God placed all kinds of beautiful trees and fruit trees in the garden. Two other trees were in the middle of the garden. One of the trees gave life—the other gave the power to know the difference between right and wrong.

10 From Eden a river flowed out to water the garden, then it divided into four rivers. 11 The first one is the Pishon River that flows through the land of Havilah, 12 where pure gold, rare perfumes, and precious stones are found. 13 The second is the Gihon River that winds through Ethiopia. ▶ 14 The Tigris River that flows east of Assyria is the third, and the fourth is the Euphrates River.

15 The LORD God put the man in the Garden of Eden to take care of it and to look after it. 16 But the LORD told him, "You may eat fruit from any tree in the garden, 17 except the one that has the power to let you know the difference between right and wrong. If you eat any fruit from that tree, you will die before the day is over!"

¹⁸ The LORD God said, "It isn't good for the man to live alone. I need to make a suitable partner for him." ¹⁹⁻²⁰ So the LORD took some soil and made animals and birds. He brought them to the man to see what names he would give each of them. Then the man named the tame animals and the birds and the wild animals. That's how they got their names.

None of these was the right kind of partner for the man. ²¹ So the LORD God made him fall into a deep sleep, and he took out one of the man's ribs. Then after closing the man's side, ²² the LORD made a woman out of the rib.

The LORD God brought her to the man, ²³ and the man exclaimed.

"Here is someone like me! She is part of my body, my own flesh and bones. She came from me, a man. So I will name her Woman!"

²⁴ That's why a man will leave his own father and mother. He marries a woman, and the two of them become like one person.

25 Although the man and his wife were both naked, they were not ashamed.

The First Sin

The snake was sneakier than any of the other wild animals that the LORD God had made. One day it came to the woman and asked,

"Did God tell you not to eat fruit from any tree in the garden?"

²The woman answered, "God said we could eat fruit from any tree in the garden, ³ except the one in the middle. He told us not to eat fruit from that tree or even to touch it. If we do, we will die."

4 "No, you won't!" the snake replied. 5 "God understands what will happen on the day you eat fruit from that tree. You will see what you have done, and you will know the difference between right and wrong, just as God does."

⁶The woman stared at the fruit. It looked beautiful and tasty. She wanted the wisdom that it would give her, and she ate some of the fruit. Her husband was there with her, so she gave some to him, and he ate it too. ⁷ At once they saw what they had done, and they realized they were naked. Then they sewed fig leaves together to make something to cover themselves.

8 Late in the afternoon a breeze began to blow, and the man and woman heard the LORD God walking in the garden. They were frightened and hid behind some trees.

⁹The LORD called out to the man and asked, "Where are you?"

10 The man answered, "I was naked, and when I heard you walking through the garden, I was frightened and hid!"

11 "How did you know you were naked?" God asked. "Did you eat any fruit from that tree in the middle of the garden?"

¹³ The LORD God then asked the woman, "What have you done?"

17 The LORD said to the man,

"You listened to your wife and ate fruit from that tree. And so, the ground will be under a curse because of what you did. As long as you live, you will have to struggle to grow enough food. 18 Your food will be plants. but the ground will produce thorns and thistles. 19 You will have to sweat to earn a living: you were made out of soil, and you will once again turn into soil "

²⁰ The man Adam named his wife Eve because she would become the mother of all who live.

21 Then the LORD God made clothes out of animal skins for the man and his wife.

22 The LORD said, "These people now know the difference between right and wrong, just as we do. But they must not be allowed to eat fruit from the tree that lets them live forever." 23 So the LORD God sent them out of the Garden of Eden, where they would have to work the ground from which the man had been made. 24 Then God put winged creatures at the entrance to the garden and a flaming, flashing sword to guard the way to the lifegiving tree.

⁹ Afterwards the LORD asked Cain, "Where is Abel?"

"How should I know?" he answered. "Am I supposed to look after my brother?"

10 Then the LORD said:

Why have you done this terrible thing? You killed your own brother, and his blood flowed onto the ground. Now his blood is calling out for me to punish you. 11 And so, I'll put you under a curse. Because you killed Abel and made his blood run out on the ground, you will never be able to farm the land again. 12 If you try to farm the land, it won't produce anything for you. From now on, you'll be without a home, and you'll spend the rest of your life wandering from place to place.

13 "This punishment is too hard!" Cain said. 14 "You're making me leave my home and live far from you. I will have to wander about without a home, and just anyone could kill me."

15 "No!" > the LORD answered. "Anyone who kills you will be punished seven times worse than I am punishing you." So the LORD put a mark on Cain to warn everyone not to kill him. 16 But Cain had to go far from the LORD and live in the Land of Wandering. > which is east of Eden.

¹⁹ Lamech married Adah, then Zillah. ²⁰⁻²¹ Lamech and Adah had two sons. Jabal and Jubal. Their son

Jabal was the first to live in tents and raise sheep and goats. Jubal was the first to play harps and flutes.
